


ANNUAL REPORT 2018-2019



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Dear Friends and Supporters,

The 2018-19 was another successful one at Nativity Worcester – all thanks to our community.

We continue to deliver on the mission that our founders laid out for us seventeen (17) years ago – educating the underserved young men of Worcester, guiding them on a journey of self-discovery in the Jesuit tradition, and helping them to achieve at their highest potential while striving for a better future for themselves, their family, and their community. Nowhere was that more evident than in the words of Glodi, a member of the Espinal Class of 2020 who remarked during his speech at this year's Spring Auction Night,

"Before I went to Nativity, I had no meaning behind my life. No one to show me the way. It was like trying to climb a perfectly smooth mountain. Then, Nativity showed me the way. This school opened my eyes to a missing puzzle piece that was found. I learned that I was more than what I was told I was. Now I can answer that question, Nativity has to lead me to become a dreamer. No one could guess that the little immigrant from Uganda could succeed. I was exposed to the true nature of the world but I saw something, I saw hope. I dreamt of a world where I could protect everyone. A dream that felt so distant, but this school showed me that anything was possible."

Once again, we've seen students achieve on levels of middle school, high school, college, and career, but not without failures and unexpected detours. With that in mind, we continue to look to what more we can do or how we can get better at what we are already doing. On behalf of the entire Nativity Worcester community, I would like to extend my deepest gratitude to all of those who have contributed to the mission of Nativity School of Worcester over the past year. With your help, over seven hundred (700) donors contributed over \$1.3M for the annual operation of the school. Beyond that, we also witnessed an incredible fund raising effort in honor of the late Nancy Flaherty, which established the school's first endowed scholarship fund for graduates in high school to assist grads and their families with tuition expenses. And lastly, "It's OK to be Good Here", our first-ever capital campaign, concluded after 6 years, having exceeded its bold and lofty goal of \$10.5M - a remarkable accomplishment, which received national media attention.

We are thankful for all that you do to support us in our mission to serve our students, graduates, and families. The pages that follow illustrate how our stewardship of your investment has provided a safe place for our Nativity Men to learn, to grow, and become men with a compassionate commitment to serving others. I look forward to a bright future and to all that lies ahead.

RUSTYLEE'S GRADUATION SPEECH

Good Evening, my name is Rustylee Agyemang and before I get started, I'd like to formally welcome you to the Rev. Matteo Ricci Class graduation of 2019. It is a privilege and honor to be standing here in front of you as a representative from my class to speak to you all about my time here and my words to give you. It's just, . . so hard to believe that around four years ago today, I was stressing over how I'd do in the fifth grade year of Nativity even though I wasn't even out of fourth grade yet. I remember I kept pacing back and forth trying to figure out the ultimate handshake for Mr. Dillon to leave him in awe. Although I don't think I quite got him as good with the handshake, I think it's pretty up there. Also, Mr. Collins most definitely gave me a run for my money when it came to a good handshake. It reminds me of Mr. Zequira's, nice and firm just to wake you right up in the morning. No amount of coffee can equal the amount of energy one of their handshakes gives you. It's impressive! So many great people here at Nativity have excellent handshakes! This small act of giving a handshake is what we learn on the first day of fifth grade and these handshakes are the start of the Nativity transformation!

As I look up at everyone gathered here today, a multitude of thoughts are swirling into my head and when it all compresses, it comes back to one simple word. Gratitude. To me gratitude is the ability to show thankfulness and indebtedness. Debt, huh? No matter what I do for this school I'll never be able to pay back this school for all the knowledge, materials, (and experiences). The amount of gratitude that I have for Nativity is immeasurable. It's just crazy how much this school has done for me. Nativity not only provides us with a spectacular education, but also with life changing experiences. Without these experiences I have no clue where I would be right now. For example, in the summer session this year, my class and I did something called the Youth Philanthropy Initiative, where we went to various non-profit organizations such as: Tenacity, Worcester Refugee Assistance Project, St. John's Food Pantry, and Safe Homes. and experienced their day-today. After seeing all of them, we came together to divide a budget of \$5,000 between the organizations. I learned how when involving yourself in Philanthropy, you have to make sure when choosing places to donate money to, you have to think about your own beliefs and values when making decisions. Although it may be biased, it's very important to think about what you think is important.

Four Years Ago today, I was sitting in that seat over there, and Prince Collins from the Brooks Class 2016, was up here at this very lectern at my older brother, AJ's graduation. Now that I'm here and thinking about that, I feel old. Because when I was sitting in that seat down there, I definitely didn't have my graduation in mind at all. A part of me even feared that even if I did make it to Eighth Grade, would I be able to survive Ms. Torres class? However, the help of the faculty and staff pushed us forward to complete new challenges and I think I speak for all students at Nativity that we wouldn't be the growing men we are today without them.

As I look back to reflect, and say "Dang, it's been 4 years" repeatedly, I think about things I haven't even thought about in a long time. On my first day, I could never forget my seating arrangement. It was Christian, Jadyn and I sitting in a 3 person cluster. The first thing Christian does once we all get settled is introduce himself to us, opening his jurisdiction towards people he didn't even know. That, "Hi, I'm Christian" was what I needed and I didn't even know it. From then on, I was just comfortable in the class, my classmates that I just met that very day were already becoming my best friends, in a matter of 2 class periods. That also brings back the memory of when I was in fifth grade and Randal from the Fernando Class of 2015, challenged me. Back then, it was silly and meaningless but apart of me still held on to it. Randal told me that if I got into a school like Worcester Academy or Bancroft, he would give me a Rice Krispie treat, if I didn't, I'd owe him a Rice Krispie treat. Now, me being in fifth grade I would never turn down a Rice Krispie treat- who am I kidding, even now I do NOT turn down a Rice Krispie treat. So I happily accepted, and let's just say, I'm waiting for that Rice Krispie treat Randal.

When my fifth grade year at Nativity ended, I had finally grown accustomed to how Nativity worked and I was really excited for 6th Grade. But my one fear about 6th grade was a person, and her name rhymes with "Distress". Oh, Ms. Torres. I was absolutely TERRIFIED of her. Now don't get me wrong, I love Ms. Torres to pieces, but all those stories my older brother told me of Ms. Torres made me absolutely fear her. The funny part is, she was my fifth grade advisor, and yet I was still intimidated every time I stepped into her classroom for advisory.I know she's strict because she knows that we are capable of greater things and just wants what's best for us, but it's just scary y'know? Ms. Torres gives you that look when you're doing something you're not supposed to and it just gives ANYONE the shivers. To sum it up, I was not looking forward to 6th Grade that much. But when a letter came home with us saying how Ms. Munar would be the new 6th Grade Lead Teacher and Ms. Torres would move on to 8th Grade Lead teacher, it was a moment of relief. Alas, I knew that I was just living on borrowed time, because I'd eventually run into her in 8th Grade. I realized that I just needed to suck it up and make it through, because that's what a Nativity Man would do.

What I've learned from people that came before me is: don't be afraid to ask for help and visit often. I want to be like Demetrius of the Pro Class of 2011, in that regard. Even though he's graduated all those years ago, he still comes often and knows all the names of the new 5th graders, he's their model of what a Nativity Graduate should be and I respect that. The Faculty here has taught me to find a team, no a family in wherever I go. Make bonds, and cherish them with the ones you work with, adults and students alike. During the High School Placement Process in 7th Grade, I was kinda bummed out that we missed out on the opportunity for doing something for Spring Arts Night just for something that had to do with HIGH SCHOOL. I didn't see the point of it because we weren't even in 8th Grade at the time, so why did it matter? But again, I am grateful for Mrs. Kent & Ms. Clair for all the patience they had with us during the High School Prep class in 7th Grade. They adjusted with us and adapted with our ability to work and pushed us for greater, preparing us for the more severe and important High School Preparation with Mr. Perry. Oooh Mr. Perry, what are we going to do with you. No but in all seriousness, Mr. Perry and Ms. Seavello have been a TREMENDOUS help with the High School placement process. If it had not been for them, I would be owing Randal a Rice Krispie treat right about now. I have nothing but Gratitude for the two of them.

When I was in Fifth Grade, I knew I wanted to get into either two schools; Bancroft and Worcester Academy. St. John's is great and all, but I've been following my brother to schools my whole life, and I just didn't think that St. John's was my BEST fit. No offense Mr. Zequeira, love you. But I'll have to admit, it was quite tempting to go to St. Johns

because of the people I knew there. Not only the students, but the teachers as well. The one person who was my biggest tempter besides Mr. Zequeira was Mr. Whelan, a Religion teacher from St. John's. He and I are quite fond of one another and we have this mentor-student relationship. But, Mrs. Kent always said that the final decision was yours (but also your parents') decision. That was how I grew to be more welcoming to other schools. When I looked at Bancroft and saw the day-to-day routine I was hooked, the way they operate is quite similar to Nativity which is always nice. And I'm proud to announce that I'll be attending Bancroft in the 2019-2020 school year as a Freshman.

Throughout my time here, I've seen two major words come up a lot, especially at the end of this year. Those words are Change and Gratitude. This change is definitely going to be a big one, going to a new school and all. But things won't be all too difficult because I have SIX other boys going to Bancroft with me! I am happy that I found that special spark at Bancroft. This school encouraged me to want to engage and pursue an education there. I think I speak for all of us when I say that without Nativity, we wouldn't have been exposed to a great variety of high schools.

As we move on we will continue to embody the four pillars: Strength, Scholarship, Service, and Character. These four core ideas of Nativity will allow us to make judgments and persevere no matter what the future has in store for us. Nativity was a HUGE stepping stone in our strive to success. Nativity provided all the gear to climb the mountains and go through the treacherous weather. Nativity held us up and it will continue to provide and hold us up in times of failure and in triumph. There will never be anything like Nativity, nothing that will give me as many opportunities that I've received from this school even in a four year time period. I would like to thank everyone who came here this evening. Family, Friends, and guests alike. My class and I are so blessed for the support and generosity of all of you. Avards Ceremony

On Monday, June 3rd, Nativity School of Worcester held its annual year-end Pillar awards ceremony. At this event, which begins the week leading to graduation, the school's faculty and staff present awards to students in all grades that best reflect the four pillars of strength (vires), character (mores), service (christianitas), and scholarship (studium). Awards are given for three of the pillars to one student from the eighth grade, and one student from the fifth-, sixth-, or seventh-grade, while the final pillar award of scholarship is presented to one student from all four classes. The Vires Award was given to Christian Morales, Ricci Class of 2019 and Ray Rivera-Lopez, Espinal Class of 2020. The Vires Award is given to the

students who show exceptional strength during their time at Nativity Worcester. This student faces struggles head-on, and doesn't shy away from a challenge. The Mores Award was presented to Malcolm Nelson, Ricci Class of 2019 and Alvin Tete-Djwau, Mveng Class of 2021. The Mores Award is given to the students who display exceptional character and distinguish themselves with qualities of honesty, politeness, and fairness to others. The Christianitas Award was presented to Jason Williams, Ricci Class of 2019 and Zavian Black, Espinal Class of 2020. This award is given to students who show exceptional dedication to service both inside and outside of the school and who never hesitate to put others before

them. The Studium Award was presented to Ryan Thai-Do, Ricci Class of 2019, Kemp Nguyen, Espinal Class of 2020, Oscar Rodriguez, Mveng Class of 2021, and Marcos Fernandez, Grande Class of 2022. The Studium Award goes to the student who shows the greatest dedication to scholarship by displaying intellectual curiosity and a drive for academic success. The Spirit Award is awarded during the graduation ceremony to a member of the eighth grade class who has exemplified what it means to be a Nativity Man on countless occasions during his time at Nativity Worcester. This year's recipient was Rusty Lee Agyemang, Ricci Class of 2019. Congratulations to all of this year's award winners!

20 19 SUMMER Service

Nativity School of Worcester supplements our school year's education with a mandatory summer session. During the month of July, Nativity Worcester faculty, staff, and students return for three weeks of classes, field trips, and a comprehensive servicelearning program. During servicelearning, students reach out into the city and surrounding area through an integrated academic and communityservice-oriented program. Nativity Worcester purposely plans our Summer of Service session to expose students to a wider variety of experiences than the traditional school year allows.

The mornings begin with language arts and math classes, which help our students improve and excel in core academic subjects before the traditional school year begins. Students that are struggling in language arts and math are able to make significant improvements as a result of additional time spent in the classroom and personalized instruction from our faculty. The faculty is also able to challenge students that are excelling in these subject areas to ensure they reach their full potential.

Students also participate in an integrated academic and community-serviceoriented program. Students take a service-learning class where they learn about current and local issues affecting our community. In the afternoons, students and faculty volunteer at local organizations related to the topics they are learning about in the servicelearning class. The goal of the servicebased learning is to engage students in projects that not only teach them valuable, curriculum-linked lessons, but also empower them to recognize the ways they can improve their community.

For 5-7th graders, students rotate through three service-learning sites, while the 8th graders take part in their own program, the Youth Philanthropy Initiative (which is detailed below). In 2019, these 5-7th graders' sites included CENTRO, Worcester Common Ground, and Worcester Quality of Life Team. Established in 1977, CENTRO, formerly Centro Las Americas, is the largest minority-led, communitybased, multi-service, multicultural, multilingual, nonprofit organization in Central Massachusetts. CENTRO's primary purpose is to assist individuals and families striving to reach selfsufficiency while promoting social responsibility, fostering cultural identity, and encouraging families to be significant contributors to the community as a whole. Worcester Common Ground, Inc. (WCG), a Community Development Corporation (CDC) was founded in 1988 in response to concern about absentee ownership of land and property, the high cost of housing, the displacement of families from their homes into shelters, and the fading dream of home ownership and economic opportunity for those living in the most underserved neighborhood of Central Worcester, Massachusetts.

For the tenth consecutive year, the eighth grade students had the opportunity to work on the Highland Street Foundation's Youth Philanthropy Initiative. Students working on this project learn about philanthropy and nonprofit organizations in their service learning classes. They reflect on their own personal values to determine what community services they deem most important for the people within Worcester. The students then choose how to disburse the \$5,000 of grant funds to four organizations. In 2019, the eighth graders worked specifically with and donated to FreshStart508 (\$1,500), El Buen Samaritano Food Program (\$1,500), Latin American Health Alliance dba Hector Reyes House (\$1,000) and Straight Ahead Ministries. The Nativity Worcester community completed over 1,300 hours of service in the greater Worcester community during the 2019 Summer of Service.



Fellows Graduation

This year, four Nativity Teaching Fellows, concluded their two years of service at Nativity School of Worcester. We are very grateful to them for their dedication to our students, their families, and our mission.

Lily Cook

Lily Cook is a graduate of the College of the Holy Cross class of 2017 was a member of the 5th grade team. Her time with Nativity Worcester began as an intern in the summer of 2016. She served as the Operations Assistant during her fellowship, coach for the baseball team, and hosted the Cooking Club. She continues to work with the Nativity model schools as their 4th Grade teacher at Nativity Preparatory School of Boston.

Ashley Fairbanks

Ashley Fairbanks graduated from the College of the Holy Cross in 2017. She was a member of the 6th grade team, and an active participant for the cross country and track teams. After completing her Master's of Arts in School Counseling, Ashley began her counseling career as a Guidance Counselor at Nashoba Regional Valley High School.

Bowen Lee

Bowen graduated from the College of the Holy Cross in 2017. He joined the Nativity Worcester teaching fellowship in 2017 and taught health and social studies on the eighth grade team. Bowen organized advisory activities, and he was the coordinator of Nativity's student council. He also coached soccer and basketball. During his time in the fellowship, Bowen completed his Masters of Arts in Teaching from Clark University with a focus in history and is now Nativity Worcester's 8th Grade Lead Teacher.

Zoë Ryan

Zoë is a member of the class of 2017 from the College of the Holy Cross. Her time with Nativity Worcester began as an intern with the Advancement team in the 2016-2017 school year. She was a member of the 7th grade team, and continued her time in the advancement office as the advancement assistant for 2 years. She also hosted the Zen club, and coached Cross Country and Track. She now lives in Clearwater, FL and is continuing her counseling career.



Graduate Support Program

Nativity Worcester is committed to the success of its students not only in middle school, but also in high school and college as well, through guidance, tutoring and financial support. Staffed by a Director of High School Placement and Support, a Director of College Placement and Transition and an Associate Director of Advancement, Nativity Worcester's Graduate Support Program meets the growing and diverse needs of our graduates. We provide a safe and quiet space for homework help or schoolwork, high school transition and completion support, a new mentoring program, after-school and summer job search assistance, program events and community service opportunities, college search and financial aid application support. The Joanne and Brian McClatchy Graduate support room is a dedicated space on campus that functions as a safe haven for program participants looking to use computers for research, receive tutoring, or work on school assignments in a space conducive to learning.

Nativity School of Worcester has graduated 186 students from 14 classes. The school has witnessed fourteen successful classes of graduates matriculate in the area's high schools: Assabet Valley Technical High School, Bancroft School, Burncoat High School, Cheshire Academy (CT), Claremont Academy, Cornerstone Charter Academy (FL), Davies High School (ND), Deerfield Academy, Doherty Memorial High School, Gardner High School, Gould Academy (ME), Haverhill High School, Holy Name Central Catholic Junior-Senior High School, Leicester High School, Masconomet Regional High School (ABC Program), New Canaan High School (CT), Noble & Greenough School, North High School, Oxford High School, Portsmouth Abbey School (RI), Saint Bernard's High School, Saint Mary's Junior/Senior High School, Saint Peter-Marian Junior-Senior High School, Saint John's High School, South High School, South High School - Goddard Scholars Program, South Salem High School (OR), University Park Campus School, Worcester Academy, and Worcester Technical High School.

With application assistance and guidance from Nativity Worcester's Graduate Support Program, Nativity graduates from the classes of 2006-2015 are attending or have attended the following colleges: American University, Assumption College, Boston College, Bridegwater State University, Chemeketa Community College, Clark University, College of the Holy Cross, Curry College, DePaul University, Diablo Valley College, Emerson College, Emmanuel College, Fitchburg State University, Fordham University, Franklin Pierce University, High Point University, Johnson & Whales University, Johnson & Wales University - North Miami, Massachusetts College of Liberal Arts, Molloy College, Morehouse College, Nichols College, Oregon State University, Providence College, Quinnipiac University, Quinsigamond Community College, Southern Adventist University, St. Anselm College, University of California at Berkeley, University of Hartford, University of Massachusetts - Amherst, University of Massachusetts - Dartmouth, University of Massachusetts - Lowell, University of New Haven, Wentworth Institute of Technology, Western New England University, Westfield State University, Worcester Polytechnic Institute, Worcester State University, and Yale University.

After completing their Bachelor's Degree, 6 Nativity Worcester graduates chose to continue their education with a Master's Degree. These graduates are currently pursuing, or have completed their studies, at the following schools: Assumption College, Northeastern University, University of Chicago, Bowling & Green State University, Molloy College.

Nativity School of Worcester is proud to announce that 12 members of the Fernando Class of 2015 have the following post-secondary plans: Boston College, Wentworth Institute of Technology, Quinsigamond Community College, Grafton Job Corp, Morehouse College, College of the Holy Cross, Worcester State University, Westfield State University, Bridgewater State University.

Nativity Worcester graduates find themselves at a disadvantage as they pursue their degree and look for gainful employment. As part of our Graduate Support Program, we have developed a job placement and internship program designed to connect our graduates with employers through the Nativity Worcester community. This connection provides a channel for hard working, driven young men to connect with employers, gain experience, and gain access into the corporate world.

NANCY'S Fund

As we begin our 17th academic school year, I would like to express gratitude to all who supported Nancy's Fund. As you know, Nancy and Joe Flaherty have supported our Nativity Men for 16 years. The establishment of Nancy's Fund honors Nancy's legacy by providing a permanent endowment to cover funding gaps for Nativity Worcester graduates as they move onto their respective high schools. Over \$680,000 was raised for Nancy's Fund this past year and for that we are truly thankful.

The eighth grade of 2019 graduated from Nativity Worcester on June 7th and 100% of the class was accepted into, and received sufficient financial aid to attend, a private high school. They began their high school journeys at Bancroft School, Gould Academy, Saint John's High School, and Worcester Academy this fall. While the financial aid for the boys comes principally from the new schools they will be attending, Nativity Worcester takes responsibility for the shortfall and related costs. Beginning this spring, Nancy's Fund will be used to cover the tuition gap which is a huge aid to the boys, their families, and our school.

We have a Graduate Support Team which continues to communicate with our recent graduates throughout the school year and monitors academic or family issues where we can step in and help. Graduate support also works with them in the spring on resume writing, interviewing skills, and applying/interviewing for summer jobs.

We could not be more proud of all our Nativity Men. With continued guidance from the Graduate Support team, they are well on their way to successful futures. We look forward to awarding the first recipients of the Nancy's Fund scholarships in the Spring of 2020.

Thank you, again, for your gift to Nancy's Fund and your generous support of our Nativity Men.



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NATIVITY WORCESTER REACHES \$10.5M CAMPAIGN GOAL

During the Spring Auction celebration, we announced surpassing our \$10.5 million goal of our "It's OK to Be Good Here" campaign. More than 500 individuals, corporations, and charitable foundations have given to the school's efforts toward creating a more financially stable future since the campaign's inception in 2013.

"I am incredibly grateful to our benefactors for their generosity and enthusiasm for our mission,' said Nativity Worcester President Patrick T. Maloney. "We've asked our community, which already helps us to raise our entire operating budget year after year, to dig even deeper and help us to provide a more long-term financial stability. Keep in mind that the vast majority of these supporters are not alumni, nor are they families, but rather a group of people dedicated to our Nativity Men and their futures without any benefit to themselves. It's incredible to witness and a blessing to be a part of."

This was our school's first-ever capital campaign and was publicly launched in October 2013. Campaign funds are being used to retire the long-term debt that the institution had on its school building and a residence that houses some of the teachers, fund capital projects in both of those properties, and establish an endowment for the school, all while still raising the funding needed to operate the school on an annual basis.

In addition to a dedicated advancement staff, Maloney also credited dedicated volunteers and trustees, including capital campaign co-chairs Charles Weiss, Ph.D. and Michael Tsotsis, along with Board of Trustees Chair, J. Christopher Collins, for their guidance and leadership.

"Our school community's support for this campaign has been overwhelming," said Collins. "Every gift was important. Everyone who has been connected to this incredible school, including graduates, parents, trustees, and faculty have all come together to support this effort."

And yet, despite the campaign's success, its co-chairs remain
